Presentation

Heather Anderson introduced the speaker, Jean Allen-Ikeson from Dundas, Ontario. Jean is an accredited American Orchid Society Judge with the Toronto Judging Centre. She has written numerous articles for

Orchids and is presently working on a

webinar for the AOS. She is Chair of the Editorial Board of the AOS.

Heather had visited Jean's greenhouse in Ontario 7 or 8 years ago, but Jean no longer has a commercial greenhouse. She continues to grow a variety of *Cattleya* species and hybrids in her lean-to greenhouse. Conditions for the presentation were not ideal because we didn't have access to the projector or screen. Instead, Jean set up her laptop computer for all to view and we made the most of it.



MAY MEETING MINUTES, CONT.

The Story of White Cattleyas presented by Jean Allen-Ikeson.

White Cattleyas were premier and sought after in the days of corsages. White is the colour of weddings and goes with any colour or décor. However, white Catts were a rarity, and form needed to be "improved" for the corsage market. By the 1960s, white Catts were fantastic!

Whites are the result of a mutation in the anthocyanin genes, which normally produce lavender or purple coloration in *Cattleyas*. The genetics for the orchid lip are separate from that for the petals and sepals. In white orchids, there are gene deletions in both lips and petals/sepals.

There were primarily four large white Cattleya species that were used for breeding: C. trianae (crystalline white, full wide petals, winter bloomer), C. warscewiczii (late spring to early fall bloomer, faint blush in sunlight) C. mossiae var wagneri (chalk white flower, spring and Easter bloomer, smaller plant but with more flowers), and C. gaskelliana var alba (late summer to fall bloomer, heavy substance). Using these species and their hybrids, flowers could be obtained year-round, which was very important for the cut flower industry. Their hybrids were bred back to the species many times, so they became very consistent. From C. gaskelliana was produced Cattleya Bow Bells. the most famous white Cattleya ever. It was produced before the war, and had a trumpet shaped lip with a bit of yellow or orange. It was the basis for a lot of breeding and produced many very successful hybrids. Another hybrid popular for breeding is C. Joyce Hannington. However, its genetics are more complex, and results are not as consistent as with Bow Bells. Breeding with Bow Bells produced some chance tetraploid hybrids, as well as the usual diploid hybrids. Tetraploids have fuller, stiffer blossoms, so hold up better as cut flowers. C. Bow Bells was bred back to C. mossiae and produced C. Pearl Harbor, which had more compact flowers of better substance. Another Bow Bells hybrid was C. Empress Bells.

Ms. Ikeson-Allen's favourite white *Cattleya* is *C*. Ruth Gee, produced in the 70s. It is very consistent and reliable, which is very important for people breeding for cut flowers. In Ruth Gee's pedigree, there is a lot of back-crossing to *C*. Edithiae, so much so that it almost developed as a species and is therefore very consistent in form and colour.

When wrist corsages became popular, florists needed smaller flowers. *C. loddigesii* var *alba*, with its strong stem, heavy substance, smaller flowers and more floriferous growth habit, was good for this purpose, along with its hybrid, *C.* Henrietta Japhet. Hybrids of *C.* Henrietta Japhet became popular as a type; they were clear white cluster bloomers.

C. Hawaiian Wedding Song, a hybrid of C. Claesiana with C. Angel Bells, is one of the most popular white Catts. It was the first white Catt that was popular for home growing.

C. walkeriana has a white form, however it is fussy and not that easy to grow. It likes being misted but doesn't like being soggy or wet. It is a very small plant, almost a mini-Catt, with flowers that are more open than most. The lip opens and flattens out; it is not wrapped around the column.

C. Angelwalker is another popular compact growing plant, although not a mini. It gives more flowers than C. Hawaiian Wedding Song.

Breeding of a white to a white to get a white doesn't always work out. Sometimes you will get lavender, a big disappointment if you've waited six years for the outcome. There are two common gene deletions for white: some had gene deletion c while others exhibited gene deletion r. A white c deletion parent bred to a white c deletion parent will produce white, but a white c deletion parent bred to a white r deletion parent will produce lavender or purple. And even when you bred an r deletion to an r deletion, sometimes you'll get the c deletion, which produces lavender flowers.

Sometimes the so-called white flowers were actually lavender flowers with a lot of colour inhibitor that pales them out to get white. Corsage makers were "slipping them in" by raising them in low light conditions to get white.

Another method of getting white flowers was to use a parent with a "suppressor" gene for the lavender colour; an example of this is *RI digbyana*.

Sometimes a white mutation will occur naturally. This is known to occur in the wild, and occasionally in the greenhouse. An example of this is

Rhyncholaeliocattleya Ranger Six 'A-OK' FCC/AOS. C. Empress Bells was crossed with Rlc. Nacouchee. The breeders expected lavender flowers, and out of one thousand plants, they got 999 lavenders and one white cultivar, which they named 'A-OK'. They sold off the lavenders for practically nothing, but 'A-OK' was mericloned and used for breeding.

Nowadays people want smaller mini-Catts, and white mini-Catts are the Holy Grail. However, production of consistent white mini-Catts has been difficult. An exception to this is *Laeliocattleya* Puppy Love, which is floriferous and very easy to grow. It has a white clone called 'Innocence'. Another perfect white mutation of a mini-Catt is C. 'China Doll', an offspring of C. walkeriana.

In Australia, it is very difficult to bring plants in, so people there do their own breeding. When breeding orchids, it often takes until the third blooming year to get the best blooms. It takes a while for the plants to accumulate enough energy and sugars (mannin, from the sugar mannose) to bloom at their best. A lot of Australians add molasses to their water to add enough sugar to get better flowers. However, Ms. Allen-Ikeson is concerned that that might encourage mould or ants. At the end of her talk, Ms. Allen-Ikeson encouraged those in attendance to buy memberships in the American Orchid Society. Their website is aos.org. (The Saskatchewan Orchid Society has a membership with the AOS.)

Future Speakers

Heather Anderson reported that our speaker in September will be Francisco Miranda of Miranda Orchids in Brazil. He will be bringing Brazilian Cattleyas for pre-orders and for sale.

Our speaker in October 2019 will be Fred Clarke of Sunset Valley Orchids, and later on in the winter, the Orchid Species Preservation Foundation will be bringing in a speaker who will bring orchids from different growers in Hawaii.

Plant Sale Jean didn't bring plants for sale, but there are a number of member's plants for sale. When your number is called, you can select one plant. After all the numbers are drawn you can select more if desired. Pay for the plants at the treasurer's table.

There were 30 plants and 3 books on the sale table. About 11 plants sold.
