She is on many international orchid committees involving orchid conservation and judging, and is an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society. ### SEPTEMBER GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

**DATE:** September 24, 2022, 1:30 PM CST

**LOCATION:** Cosmo Civic Center, due to water damage at Elim Church. October and November meetings will be held at the Cosmo Civic Center, and hopefully return to Elim Church in January, 2023.

#### **Announcements:**

- Tracey Thue, SOS President, welcomed everyone to the meeting, along with members joining via Zoom.
- There is one guest: Tracey's husband, Marlow, who is also selling 50/50 tickets today at \$5 each as a fundraiser for the SOS.
- Jenn Burgess is stepping in as secretary today.
- Pat Randall is photographing plants from the Show and Tell table.
- Membership renewals are due this month for the 2022-23 year: \$25/single; \$30/family. Members can receive a 10% discount at Early's for orchid-related items if they show their card. Payments can be made by cash, cheque, or etransfer to Cheryl Grummett. Cheques can be mailed to the SOS.
- Plant sale table: let Donna know your member number (on your name tag) to enter the draw to buy plants.
- Next meeting, Oct. 22, Cordelia Head of J&L Orchids, Connecticut, will be coming. Heather has a pre-order list of plants with USD prices, and will send it to members next week with an order deadline date. Cordelia's presentation topic to be determined.
- 2023 SOS Calendar: a sign-up sheet for calendar orders will be available next month at the October meeting. Calendars will be available by the November meeting.
- Zoom option for SOS meetings will continue to be offered for the foreseeable future.
- **Resource table**: Don showed a few new products: large perlite (AKA sponge rock) 1/2-3/4" diameter pieces; bags oof pumice pellets, 2L/\$12; and Grotek GrowthMax seaweed-based fertilizer, 16 oz. bottles/\$24. Also available are free samples of donated black-coated wire to wrap mounted plants. If popular, the resource table will acquire more.
- **Library:** Deb announced that this year's magazines are available at the meeting, and she can also take requests for any other books/magazines for borrowing.

#### **Problem Corner:**

One member described Cattleya leaves that were turning yellow but appeared otherwise healthy. It was suggested that they may be too close to the lights.

#### **Show and Tell:**

<u>Pat R.</u> brought an *Epilaeliocattleya* **Volcano Trick 'Orange Fire' AM/AOS**, purchased from Ching Hua in 2012. Grown in medium bark under lights. A beautiful spray of orange and red flowers.

<u>Heather A</u>. showed *Dendrobium* **Baby Hibiki**, a new plant still potted in sphagnum from Ten Shin. Heather numbers her tags for cataloguing and writes dates on the tag for repotting. This cute plant came in bloom with pink flowers.

<u>Jenn B</u>. brought a *Rhyncholaeliocattleya* **Ports of Paradise 'Emerald Isle' AM/AOS**, grown in a south-east window. This is a large plant that will need dividing soon.

#### **GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, CONT.**

#### Presentation: "An Orch

## "An Orchid Summer Holiday.....and Fall Dip"

An updated Powerpoint presentation originally given in 2016, talking about the benefits of taking orchids outside for the summer. Benefits include stronger growth and more blooms, but you must also consider the low humidity and insects encountered outdoors. Preparation of outdoor and indoor spaces was discussed, and we saw some photos of the great blooms that resulted from a summer outdoors.

- **Temperature**: avoid frosts and low nighttime temperatures; judge plant tolerances and microclimates; watch for higher temperatures that some plants may not tolerate.
- Light: exposures; direct and indirect light; brighter outdoor light vs indoor; acclimatize plants so as not to burn them; take advantage of shading under trees or use shade cloth; use shaded mounting for lower light plants.
- **Humidity/Water**: monitor and adjust frequency of watering, as plants will dry out faster; consider wind and rain. Tracey waters with rain water, using a pump sprayer or garden hose.
- Insects: recipes were shared for removing insects from plants (See page 6). For control of scale, mealybug and aphids: rubbing alcohol, Neem oil and pyrethrum-based products are helpful.

Comments: Don has found the Photone app useful. It allows a smartphone to act as a light meter. Further group discussion ensued. Tracey noted that we may benefit from a presentation on lighting.

Question: about fertilizer when plants are outdoors. Tracey increases frequency when plants are outdoors. Watering frequency is increased. She rotates fertilizers and adds slow-release fertilizer to some plants such as Coelogyne. Question: do all of her outdoor plants receive rainfall? Most do, but some sheltered plants need watering; others can get too much water if they are in an outer container or tray without drainage when it rains. Question: are all of her orchids outdoors in summer? Not Phalaenopsis; they stay inside.





#### 50/50 Draw:

Total came to \$70. Pat R. was the winner, taking home \$35.

#### Sale Table:

There were approximately two dozen orchids, including a large Coelogyne, Draculas, Laelia, and Cattleya hybrids. Also some butterwort plants, useful for insect control. Not all plants were sold.

## **INSECT CONTROL RECIPES**

### **Plant Dip Recipe**

(from James Sather)

Add the following to a 5-gallon pail (20L) and mix well:

15 - 18L warm water

3 x 375 mL 3% hydrogen peroxide

3 x 375 mL 70% Isopropyl alcohol (rubbing alcohol)

1/4 cup Neem oil

1/4 cup Sunlight dish soap

Immerse plant in solution. Wash by hand any leaves sticking out. Let soak 5 - 10 minutes. Drain. Let dry, and take plant inside.

## **Spider Mite Spray**

(Bob's recipe from Horst Bohne)

1 L water

1/2 tsp. Neem oil

25 mL horticultural oil

Touch of antibacterial soap

Spray both sides of leaves and let dry.

## **Spider Mite Spray**

(from Ingrid Schmidt-Ostrander)

I/4 cup baking soda
I/2 cup apple cider vinegar
I Tablespoon lemon juice
2 drops dish soap
I/4 teaspoon Epsom salts

Dissolve the Epsom salts in 1 cup very hot water. Put the rest of the ingredients in a 2L bottle. Add Epsom salt solution to the bottle and fill to the top with water. Shake well.

Cover the growing medium with plastic, turn off lights, and mist plant all over.

Wait 20 minutes; spray with water to rinse off the solution and the dissolved remains of mites and eggs.

#### Phalaenopsis NOID

My first orchid, given to me by a great aunt. Always brings a smile to my face when it blooms.



# Ludisia discolor x Anoectochilus roxburghii

Purchased from the Little Big Plant Company in 2020. It blooms almost continually and is an easy and vigorous grower. Grown on the terrarium floor, it threatens to overtake other *Ludisia* and *Macodes* jewel orchids.

## Cypripedium montanum

Mountain Lady Slipper. Wild in the Cypress Hills. I have been visiting this plant for over 20 years. On a good year, there can be over 17 blooms on a plant, though this is the first bloom it has produced in 4 years.

#### Dendrobium Ise 'Pearl' HCC/AOS

(Den. moniliforme x Den. officinale)

A gift from Tobi, this little Dendrobium lives on the south facing windowsill in winter where it enjoys bright light, cooler temps & dry conditions. It goes outside in summer for warmer temps, direct morning light and lots of water & fertilizer. It is wonderfully fragrant, to my nose like fruity hyacinth, or rose, thanks to its *Den. moniliforme* parent.





#### Pleurothallis recurva

Purchased from J&L Orchids when Cordelia visited us in 2018, this pretty miniature is native to South America in wet montane forests and primary cloud forests. My plant is quite happy on its tree fern mount, grown in bright shade in the living room in winter with daily watering, and outside when temps are less than 20C, given lots of water. I love the deep burgundy color of the lip.

## Spirit of Autumn

The days shorten quickly now with longer angled light that vibrates at a different frequency than in summer. Green fades into a memory of May; red shocks the brain with fire against the inconceivable blue October sky. Quivering honey and peach and copper swirl in the gentle breeze and wrap you in a tender dream that you are loathe to wake from because once you do, the chuckling robins and crying geese will be gone and winter's long monochrome will reign.

Colours kaleidoscope into each other and you're not sure what season it is. Purple nine-barks turn magenta beside the glorious pink towers of hollyhocks. Late cornflowers are a spark of summer blue beneath bright carmine hawthorn berries. It's disorienting. Like looking through a telescope at a cosmic zoom that takes you from spring to fall in three seconds - no chance to focus.

Dozing in the soft warm afternoon, eyes half-open on the linden turning to amber, it's possible to imagine this autumn light is a fine thin veil, a film of colour between worlds that you could breach with a glance or a thought if only you could get the angle right. What would you see, do you think? The spirits of lost friends and forebears? Or a neighbour universe, where plump burgundy slipper orchids bloom at the feet of a poplar tree in full, majestic fall gold?

Perhaps both. I like to think it's both.
