A Cypripedium was purchased this spring but it remained dormant all summer. It is now growing and has been brought inside. What to do with it? Suggestions from the membership and guest Bryan Emery: let it continue to grow indoors and when the leaves start to brown unpot it, place it into a paper bag with wood shavings and place in the fridge. It can then be planted outside in the spring.

Break

Presentation

Bryan Emery from the Central Vancouver Island Orchid Society gave an interesting talk on Miniature Orchids. He gave an overview of some of the miniature species available, indicating which are more tolerant of the lower humidity levels found in our homes. Restrepias, for example, are

intermediate growers preferring bright conditions and tolerant of drying out between watering. Scaphosepalums and Lepanthes need higher humidity and are great candidates for growing in a tank. Draculas can be grown in intermediate temperatures but need to be kept *wet*.

Barbosellas grow best when mounted, Bulbophyllums do best in a 50:50 mix of moss and perlite. Aeranges need to dry between waterings and be provided with good air circulation. Bryan has found success growing and flowering rupiculous Laelias in clay pots of rock with 1 inch of moss on top, the pot sitting in 1/2 inch of water. The final piece of advice from Bryan: water all of your orchids with sea weed or kelp extract! It provides micronutrients and more that help support great root growth. Healthy roots = healthy plant = flowering!

SHOW UPDATE by Heather Anderson, COC Show Co-Chair

A good meeting to discuss the upcoming COC show was held with Prairieland on October 28th. They will obtain a quote for us for the ribbons, rosettes and plates needed for the awards. The Prairieland website has a link to the SOS website and a brief description of what to expect at the 2015 COC is being written for Prairieland's website.

A Call for Entries poster has been distributed to businesses selling art supplies, quilting and fabric stores, etc. Art groups have also been contacted.

The Plant Registration position is vacant - please approach me or Cheryl Adamson for more information.

The program (pamphlet) for delegates is near completion.

There are now 4 vendors registered and the Orchid Species Preservation Foundation (of Alberta) has registered to bring an educational display to the COC show. Topics have been confirmed with 2 of the 10 or 11 speakers scheduled to give presentations at the show. Three of the speakers will present to the general public on one of Prairieland's stages.

Volunteer job descriptions have been written for the 3 positions that will be required during the show. These descriptions will be posted on the table at the entrance to the auditorium at John Dolan School for the November SOS meeting. The details of the Sponsorship Program were published in the September SOS Newsletter and this is posted on the SOS website under the COC 2015 link. INTERGENERIC CROSSES - A NAMING GAME

There are some wild and crazy names out there for orchids that have been created by crosses between different genera, and they seem to change all too frequently! Traditionally a new plant was classified according to plant morphology and growth habits. Take, for example Cattleya bowringiana, a species first described by Veitch in 1885. The plant is native to Belize and Guatemala and, based on its growth habits and plant structure Veitch placed it into the Cattleya Alliance, with the Genus name Cattleya, species name Cattleya bowringiana. In the 1990s and onward, as technologies advanced to allow genetic sequence analysis of all creatures great and small, taxonomists began a reshuffling and renaming of genera. New genera were created to accommodate species that were genetically distant from other species within the original genus. Back to the example of Cattleya bowringiana.

Guarianthe (abbreviated Gur.) was created in 2003, to describe epiphytic orchids growing in Mexico, Central America, Columbia, Venezuela and Trinidad. This new genus within the Cattleya Alliance allowed for a distinction to be made from the bifoliate *Cattleya* genus. So with the publication of a paper in the scientific journal Lankesteriana by Dressler & W.E. Higgins titled "*Guarianthe*, a Generic Name for the "*Cattleya*" skinneri Complex" (Lankesteriana 7(2003)37-38), *Cattleya* bowringiana became *Guarianthe bowringiana*.

Being a graduate of an animal molecular genetics Master's program, this shuffling as a result of genetic analyses makes sense to me. However, it does complicate plant naming and, as a hobbyist grower of a wide genera of orchids, plant labels. Rewriting labels for species that have been reclassified is relatively easy with a small collection, but wait: the new names affect naming of hybrids as well! Now things get interesting! If a plant was created from a cross between plants of two different genera (like a *Cattleya* and a *Laelia*), it is considered an intergeneric hybrid (such as Laeliocattleya, abbreviated Lc.). If the genera names changed as a result of reclassification, then the intergeneric names will have changed as well.

Now I'm going to use one of my plants that is currently flowering as an example: Cattlianthe Memoria Francis Takakura (synonymous genus is Laeliocattleva). This is an intergeneric hybrid first made in 1895 between Laeliocattleya C.G. Roebling and Cattleya bowringiana (as it was named from 1895 to 2003). Laeliocattleya C.G. Roebling is a hybrid between Cattleya gaskelliana x Laelia purpurata. But Laelia purpurata was reclassified and became Cattleya purpurata, thus changing C.G. Roebling to Cattleva C.G. Roebling! Are you still with me? Cattleya bowringiana was one of those species that was placed into a new genera called Guarianthe, and intergeneric crosses between Cattleya and Guarianthe are called Cattlianthe. Soooo, my plant is now labelled Cattlianthe Memoria Francis Takakura.

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Some other very popular "Cattleya" hybrids underwent name changes as well. Sophrolaeliocattleya (Slc) Jewel Box became Cattlianthe (Ctt) Jewel Box because it's parents were named *Cattleya aurantiaca* x Sophrolaeliocattleya Anzac, but are now named *Guarianthe aurantiaca* and Cattleya Anzac.

Are you ready for one more? How about all of those hybrids with Brassolaelia (Bl) Richard Meuller as a parent? Now this one gets complicated! I have a hybrid that was called Brassolaeliocattleva (Blc) Hawaiian Leopard but is now called Rhynchobrassoleya (Rbl) Hawaiian Leopard. It is a cross between Rhyncholaeliocattleva (Rlc) Waianae Leopard x Brassocattleya (Bc) Richard Meuller. Richard Meuller is a primary hybrid between Brassavola nodosa and Laelia milleri, but L. milleri was reclassified as *Cattleya milleri* so the plants of this cross are now called Bc. Richard Meuller. Rlc. Waianae Leopard has an enormous family tree that I am NOT going to describe here! Suffice to say that the plants in its background have undergone name changes as well, going back many generations to one of the parent species Rhycholaelia digbyana. This plant was originally described by Lindley in 1846 as Brassavola digbyana, but in 1918 the new genus Rhyncholaelia was established by Schlechter. If you have access to OrchidWhiz, do a search for Rlc. Waianae Leopard and look at the genealogy

tree; you'll be amazed at how complex it is! And this is one of the parents of my plant, Rbl. Hawaiian Leopard!
