

NOVEMBER GUEST SPEAKER

Calvin Lo, Saskatchewan Orchid Society

"Orchids of Madagascar"

Calvin has been growing orchids since the mid-2000s and his collection has travelled upwards of 3000 km around Canada over the last 15 years. Calvin's main interests are black-haired Dendrobiums and African Angraecoids. When not playing with orchids, he loves growing interesting rock garden plants and other perennials in our harsh climate. OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

DATE: October 21, 2023 1:30 p.m. CST

LOCATION: Elim Church, 419 Slimmon Road, Saskatoon

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

- Shayne Feltis welcomed everyone to the meeting.
- Guest Speaker Dave Sorokowsky is our guest presenter today, and has plants for sale from both Paph Paradise and Gold Country Orchids. Pre-orders are also available at the back of the room, with any payments to Dave in cash.
- Tracey Thue and Bob Lucas are taking the photos; Marlow T. is tending to the audio-visual equipment.
- **Memberships** are available from Donna Carlson-O'Keefe for \$25/single and \$30/family. E-transfer, cheque and cash are accepted.
- Calendars Deb Huculiak has a sign-up sheet for SOS orchid calendar orders. Calendars will be brought to the November meeting, or you can arrange pick-up from her. Price is \$15 each.
- Plant member sale table give your membership number to Donna and she will put your name in the draw to select your plants.
- **Resources** Don Keith and Tom Kondra reported that their order of Orchiata will arrive soon, and have an order list for those people wishing to purchase larger bags: \$65 for 35L; \$35 for 17-1/2 L (half a bag).
- Treats Lynn Campbell invited members to sign up to bring treats to a meeting. The next month in need of a volunteer is January.
- 50/50 Tickets \$5 for 5 tickets; available from Donna at the back of the room.
- Executive Election to be held in November. A list of candidates will be in the November newsletter. Tom Kondra noted that members are welcome to shadow an executive member to find out more about that position if they are interested.

PROBLEM CORNER:

There was a problem plant that had yellowing of its leaves, without browning, a while after being repotted. No other change in culture had occurred. A remedy to this problem was uncertain.

SHOW AND TELL:

Deb Huculiak

• *Dendrobium* Lady Colman x Happy Lady (Editor's note: registered name is *Dend*. Guo Red) - a plant acquired from a past member. It was outside during the summer, then in the greenhouse with infrequent watering prior to blooming.

Tracey Thue

- *Bifrenaria aureofulva* (though labeled as *Bifrenaria vitellina*) acquired from Ten Shin in 2015 and grown in bright light. It is moved outside for the summer and heavily watered. Before coming back inside in autumn, Tracey's plants are treated with a mix of Neem oil, peroxide and rubbing alcohol. This recipe has been printed in the past newsletters. A member noted that the Swadesh Supermarket on 22nd Street carries Neem oil.
- *Coelogyne mayeriana* purchased from Ecuagenera. This is a plant native to Malaysia. Grown with sphagnum in the mix. Orchid Digest has an issue dedicated to Coelogynes that is currently available from the library. This species doesn't appear to be deciduous.
- Paphiopedilum fairrieanum 'Red Wonder' x self the flower has just opened. It is grown in an east window. It has not been allowed to dry out, watered weekly in the winter and more frequently in the summer. It likes cooler temperatures.

Jessamy Foulds

• *Paphiopedilum* Cocoa Elegant Rouge is a plant from Ecuagenera. It benefits from light from both a window and grow lights, and is watered weekly.

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, CONTINUED

SHOW AND TELL, CONTINUED:

• *Bulbophyllum mastersianum* - this plant is a serial bloomer with an attractive fan of flowers. It has been grown under lights.

Yvette Lyster

• Rhyncholaeliocattleya Spanish Eyes 'Tian Mu' was a plant purchased from the members' sale table last month and discovered to be in bud.

Heather Anderson

- *Epidendrum porpax* a mounted plant grown in an orchidarium, misted daily. It has been in her collection for over 10 years.
- *Psygmorchis pusilla* from J&L Orchids with two blooms. Grown in high humidity in the orchidarium and misted daily.
- Cattleya Beaufort 4n x Cattleya cernua (Ed. note: registered name is Cattleya Seagulls Tiny Tim) from Gold Country, it was awarded a ribbon in Edmonton. It is grown under lights in the basement; now in a south window while in bloom.

Shayne Feltis

• *Chysis limminghei* - from Ten Shin. This is a semi-terrestrial plant, an easy grower that is grown in warm temperatures. It has big pseudo bulbs.

Bob Lucas

- *Phragmipedium* Ecuagenera Dream (*Phrag* Sedenii x *Phrag* kovachii) a cross purchased at an Alberta show and grown from seedlings. There is also one on the sale table. It is grown in a mix of coir, perlite and diatomaceous rock; fertilized once per week; watered twice per week with RO water.
- *Phalaenopsis* **Blood-Red Buddha** one of Bob's own crosses and registered with RHS in 2021. It was one of three plants that germinated from the cross. It's grown in Promix HP under lights.

PRESENTATION:

Dave Sorokowsky of Paph Paradise, California is our guest speaker. His presentation is entitled "Don't Fear the Slippers. The answer to the question: why can't I grow paphs."

Dave began his presentation with an overview on how to grow slipper orchids. Watering was first discussed, preferably using rainwater or RRO water, thoroughly watering from the top to flush out minerals. His potting media of choice is an equal mix of Orchiata classic, perlite, and charcoal. He finds that sphagnum holds too much water. Other growers have success growing semi-hydroponically with LECA pellets.

With fertilizing, use of oyster shells for calcium is important as many plants grow on limestone. Dave uses MSU fertilizer. He suggests using <u>firstrays.com</u> online calculator to get the total Nitrogen to 250 ppm during the longest days of the year, 100 ppm in winter and 150 ppm during the remainder of the year. He adjusts pH to 5.8 and advises purchasing a cheap pH meter. In addition, three times/year he waters with Epsom salts (1 tsp./gallon), adjusting pH to 5.

Dave briefly touched on pests such as mealy bugs, mites, and fungal issues, and advised to isolate newly-acquired plants before adding them to a collection.

Easily-grown plants and their culture:

- Maudiae-type hybrids. Need less light, do not like to dry out completely; repot regularly; moderate light in north or east window; warm-growing; water weekly.
- Complex paphs will tolerate cooler temperatures; N or E window; intermediate to warm.
- Parvisepalum subgenus needs warm summers, cool winters; bright light. Has crosses with multifloras. Oyster shells are beneficial; needs drainage, no wet feet. Paph Ho Chi Min recommended "grows like a weed"
- Paph venustum vigorous, moderate light; watch for mealy bugs.

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, CONTINUED

- Paph wardii moderate light
- Paph delenatii fragrant; needs good drainage
- Paph villosum a fast grower; cold-tolerant
- Paph gratrixianum not as cold-tolerant
- Paph henryanum compact; tolerates a variety of temperatures
- Sequential bloomers more light than the Maudie-type
- Paph haynaldianum grow it warm and bright; doesn't tolerate cold
- Paph lowii Dave grows it similarly to Paph haynaldianum
- Paph rothschildianum needs bright light and space
- Multiflorals need bright light; want to dry out a bit

Moderately difficult growers:

- Brachypetalum subgenus need lower light; warmer growing. Dave uses heat mats under the plants, heated to 21C.
- Paph niveum very warm grower; grows on limestone with rain year-round; use a heat mat
- Paph sukhakulii never let it dry out
- Paph charlesworthii Dave has let it dry out in January; its may need a dry rest
- Paph fairrieanum water twice/week; and NEVER, EVER divide
- Paph tigrinum grows in tree tops; likes cool summers and cold, dry winters
- Paph sangii grows with heavy rainfall; Dave has found it difficult to grow
- Paph helenae does not tolerate wet feet
- Paph armeniacum likes a wet summer, cold dry winter
- Paph vietnamense likes wet summers, dry winters; lots of calcium
- Paph emersonii likes a dry winter

More difficult to grow:

• Paph sanderianum - a warm grower

Other Hints: Dave has had success with probiotics acquired from a hydroponics store.

After showing us great photos of his new crosses at Paph Paradise, his bottom line was:

Water, water, water; repot annually; start with easy plants; match conditions to plants; and go to <u>orchidspecies.com</u> to look up the conditions your plant needs to grow well.

PLANT SALE:



The Perilous Elegance of Co-Evolution

and a pollinating moth illustrated by Thomas William Wood (1867) based on a theoretical description by naturalist Alfred Russel Wallace. The real moth was formally described in 1903 and named *Xanthopan morganii praedicta* (Madagascan Sphinx Moth) because Wallace had predicted a moth with a foot-long proboscis would be found. In 2021 the moth was re-classified as its own species, *Xanthopan praedicta* because of the length of its tongue.

There, there, and just up there. Carried by the warm sea breeze into the dark tangle of roots and trunks and lofty ravinala leaves rustling in the night, she smells it.

A scent as old and intoxicating as Madagascar shoots to her lepidopteran brain and sends the message that a nocturnal orchid is blooming. *Her* orchid.

She approaches her perfect partner, straining to sense danger in the humid air - a jumping spider in wait, perhaps - but there is only the salty tang of the ocean and a distant murmur of a black and white ruffed lemur, dreaming of his breakfast of palm flowers at dawn.

So she flies near, unfurls her prodigious tongue, and performs her dance with the comet.

A dance so synchronized in form and function that neither will survive without the other. Like ruffed lemur's nose that precisely matches ravinala's pointed flower bracts, Xanthopan's tongue is the only one in the forest long enough to reach the comet's deeply-held nectar and so capture the poised pollen at its throat.

Another decade of forest-clearing fires, a half-century more of increasingly violent cyclones, and the dance will be ended.

An achingly ancient partnership of mutual evolution will break, never to be seen again in this world.
